of Planteria News, Rhiannon James of The City Planter and garden designer Claudia de Yong also an RHS Award winner.

Team Office Plant, the Vanda, Mikado and Panda were all considered by the panel with due consideration given to whether they have that feel good factor and a calming effect.

Rhiannon James of The City Planter commented, "It was a tricky choice to make because all three plants have something quite different to offer but in the end, the Vanda orchid won out thanks to its unusual beauty, its versatility and its potential to make a real statement when used en masse. There was no deciding between the Sansevieria and the Ficus though!"

"The Vanda Orchid was hanging down with its wonderful root system on full display and vivid purple blooms adorning its head, "commented Claudia de Yong. "Whilst plants are for more than aesthetics, the Vanda orchid won on all sides."

Where did it happen?

The judging took place at Indoor Garden Design, 'home' of eFIG's Vice chairman Ian Drummond who is creative director at IGD. Ian commented, "Every year we honour a plant with this Award. It is always interesting to see which plants make the short list and eventually make the grade.

"Personally I love using all three plants but the Vanda orchid not only has all the required attributes but has that extra something when you want to make a real statement."
